Throughout this season of ordinary time (period between the Epiphany and Ash Wednesday/Lent) we have been reading and talking about Paul's letter to the church in Corinth. Paul formed this community of faith two years earlier when he first traveled to this prosperous city of commerce located about 50 miles (80 km) west of city of Athens in Greece today, at the eastern end of the Gulf of Corinth.

When Paul arrived at Corinth it had the largest population in Greece with Greeks, Jews and Romans. While the majority of Corinth was Greek, the Latin names mentioned in Paul's letter attest to its Roman influence. Corinth was not only prosperous it was the center of a plethora of pagan temples which included the temple of Aphrodite. Aphrodite is the goddess of sexual love and beauty and a culture of promiscuity was prevalent in the city. We could call it the sin city of its time.

Paul was saddened by reports of dissension among his fellow converts. Paul begins his letter with a reminder that all are to be regarded as servants of Christ.

"This, then, is how you ought to regard us: as servants of Christ and as those entrusted with the mysteries God has revealed." (1 Corinthians 4:1).

Then, while answering questions sent to him from members of the community, he addresses matters of immorality, marriage and celibacy, the conduct of women, the propriety of eating meat

offered to idols, and the worthy reception of the Lord's Supper (Eucharist). Too many times we focus on this portion of his letter, choosing to hang onto their challenges. We tend to apply what is taking place in a culture we are unfamiliar with. We don't pay attention to our own challenges today and choose not to listen to his message of correction to the community, which applies to us today regardless of the cultural problems of the past.

The community is quarreling about the nature and distribution of spiritual gifts. Paul replies that jealousy among those working in the Spirit of God is as irrational as jealousy between the eye and the ear ("because I am not an eye" read 1 Corinthians 12:15-20): both are essential to the well-being of the body as a whole.

Today we are so challenged by the busyness of our lives that we no longer argue about who has the superior gift. Instead we argue about the lack of time to share the spiritual gifts God has given us. At this time your community needs the sharing of your spiritual gifts so that we all can begin to grow and spread the word of God's love.

Why love? Because this is the month in which we celebrate our love for one another on Valentine's day. In 1 Corinthians, the most noteworthy of all Pauline texts (chapter 13), Paul explains to his fellow brothers and sisters in Christ (and us) that no gift of God—whether it be the gift of tongues, faith that moves mountains, or knowledge of mysteries—has meaning unless it is accompanied by love. He also reaffirms the reality of Christ's Resurrection—doubted or denied by some—as the very foundation of Christian faith. So, in the remaining days of this month and the days and years to come think about applying what Paul tells us. No matter what we do if we "do not have love, we gain nothing."

"4 Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant 5 or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; 6 it does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth. 7 It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things.

⁸ Love never ends." (1 Corinthians 13:4-8 NRSV)

My challenge for you is to share this love every day.





Where?

Red Bird Mission Work Camp

Beverly, KY

This is a year-round work opportunity for volunteers in mission and service-minded groups. Work Camp strives to provide home repair for low-income community residents and maintenance for Mission buildings and grounds. Some examples of work projects are roof replacement, small room additions, painting, building porches or ramps, and grounds keeping. Other light duty work is available such as cutting soup upc's, office work, craft and community store helpers, and recycling. A single fee covers the cost of each person's lodging, meals, and materials used.

What are the proposed dates?

We have tentatively selected the following weeks.

June 18th, 2023; June 25th, 2023; July 9th, 2023; July 16th, 2023

We will prioritize the weeks from 1 to 4 and based upon the size of our group and needs of Red Bird we will be assigned a week to come.

How much will it cost?

Total price per person is \$425 (\$50 deposit plus two payments of \$187.50)

Message from Bobby Scarborough **Food Pantry & Fishes and Loaves Helper**

"Helpers"



I and others have been helpers for the "Food Pantry" and "Fishes and Loaves" ministries for years. I said years because it has been going on for 21 to 22 years. There have been many "Jesus Moments." Here are a few: 1. A mother and her child come in for food. The child said "Mama does this mean we get breakfast today?" They lived in their car. 2. A man out of work, a carpenter, riding a bicycle. He came in for food and kerosene. He and his wife, she was in a wheelchair, lived in the woods in a tent. They needed kerosene to help keep warm. These stories and many more are the importance of supporting a "Food Pantry." You never know when you could need help.

"Fishes and Loaves"

We give 50 to 60 hot meals once a month to "Meals on Wheels" which is sponsored by "Bay Aging" located up the county. We give each person a hot meal, plus we give their caregiver and whoever is with them that day a meal. Who likes to eat alone? We have a pool of helpers that are drivers of the meals. If you are a driver, some month you might not be able to drive. We have a pool of drivers we pull from. We use 10 to 12 drivers a month. The cooking is done in the church Kitchen. If you are a "good" cook and would like to cook some month call (804)832-9114 for details.

"Bay Aging" used to call the "Meals on Wheels" persons to see if they needed a meal, but they are short on volunteers, so we have been calling these folks for the last three years. It's a joy and a blessing getting to know those folks. There are a lot of "Jesus Moments" such as: 1. "My daughter has had a stroke. She is a single mother with 5 children. I am her father on disability. I am the caregiver, can you ""please" give us 7 meals." 2. This one happens a lot, "I just need one meal, my wife died last week." That stops you cold. 3. One person asked if she could have 2 meals so she would have something to eat on Sunday. 4. This one was hard on the driver. This guy lived in a shack, not much more than a tent. He could hardly move, had no running water meaning not many baths. He only had a cooler to keep food in. The only thing he had to his name was a cell phone. He has since died. Very sad.

The hardest commandment that covers all commandments is the hardest to live by: "Love your neighbor as yourself." I have had people say, "They are wearing better clothes than I have" or "Look at that high-dollar car they don't need no food." This one really got to me. "I bet they go to all the food pantries." I moved here 44 years ago with a wife and 3 children a duck and a dog. I was out of work for 10 months. I worked in construction. No matter how good you were at your trade, it did not matter. Back then you couldn't buy a job, times were bad all over. I did not sell my 1-year old car or throw away my old clothes. I needed them to help me to find a job. If there had been any food pantries and I needed food I would have used them. As many of them as it took to feed my family. You're not stealing ,you're begging, asking sounds better. Close your eyes and think for a moment, what would I do if I didn't have money to buy food for my family? We know some people will take advantage. We are not about judging, that's "God's "work. Our job is to love one another. Here's something to think about: When Jesus fed the 4000 he didn't ever ask how many goats, sheep, or camels they owned. He fed them out of love, "fishes and loaves."

Our food program is a quiet mission. We don't talk about what we do. We are just helpers working together trying that best we can to love our neighbor. It's not easy but it's a start. If you would like to be a "helper" call (804)832-9114 and leave a message so someone will contact you.

Matthew 6:1-4 (NIV)

Giving to the Needy

6 "Be careful not to practice your righteousness in front of others to be seen by them. If you do, you will have no reward from your Father in heaven.

2 "So when you give to the needy, do not announce it with trumpets, as the hypocrites do in the synagogues and on the streets, to be honored by others. Truly I tell you, they have received their reward in full. 3 But when you give to the needy, do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing, 4 so that your giving may be in secret. Then your Father, who sees what is done in secret, will reward you.

An Altar/Worship Space Flower Calendar for the New Year, is posted on the Library Door in our Worship Space.



FEBRUARY - Hair bows & hair clips, hair scrunchies, hair brushes, hair pics, hair combs (sturdy, not pocketsize)


MARCH - soap, washcloths (not micro-fiber), toothbrushes (individually wrapped)
